**Taylor Rae Almonte-Roman**, was selected to receive one of the [Social Justice Mini-Grants](#) for her podcast, [On the Outside](#). Reflecting on her motivation for starting the podcast, Taylor shares: "After growing up in a predominantly white community and experiencing racism, discrimination, and ostracization throughout my youth, I was moved to create a space for people to share their stories of being marginalized. I wrote over one hundred issues of a weekly anti-racism newsletter and blog from 2020-2024 and was inspired to transform that passion project into *On the Outside*, the podcast where we talk about all of the ways we've been made to feel left out."

**Alberta Christina Cahya Pertiwi's** research focuses on Indigenous issues and sustainable development. When asked about her favorite moment in the program, Alberta shares: "One of the most memorable experiences I cherish is the field research I conducted for my thesis. I had the privilege of interacting with numerous Indigenous women hailing from diverse regions. This invaluable experience significantly enriched my knowledge, honed my skills, and deepened my understanding of my own positionality within the context of my research."



## Meet Our Alumni

**Tetiana (Tanya) Kotelnikova**, HRSMA '23, is a recipient of the Scholarship for Displaced Students, a highly competitive opportunity, which enables displaced students to pursue higher education at Columbia University. During her studies Tanya launched a mentorship program for Ukrainian youth called MentorUkraine and later co-founded Brave Generation to expand support provided to displaced Ukrainians beyond education. Born and raised in Donetsk, Ukraine, Tanya left her hometown, which was occupied by Russian forces during the armed conflict in Eastern Ukraine. She fled Ukraine after Russia's full-scale invasion in 2022. In the HRSMA program, Tanya focused on issues of social inequality, human rights in the context of war, and Russian Foreign Policy in the post-Soviet space. Her research examined the obligation of the occupying power to ensure the right to water, and Russian education policies in the occupied territories of Ukraine. Tanya was selected as a recipient of the GSAS Outstanding Recent Alumni Award and the Davis Fellowship Award.



**Maria Rohani**

**Maria Rohani**, HRSMA '17, is a seasoned human rights practitioner with over a decade of experience ranging across philanthropy, international development, big tech, UN agencies, and grassroots organizations. She currently serves as the Case and Policy Officer at Oversight Board and has previously held roles at Google, UN Women and CARE, among others. Maria is deeply passionate about technology, gender justice, and social movements. In 2024, she returned to ISHR to lead a workshop, titled "Building A Human Rights Career Beyond the Traditional Path," as part of Institute's Human Rights Training Series. During this interactive training, Maria introduced students to career opportunities outside of the mainstream human rights field, provided guidance on how to leverage a human rights degree in diverse sectors, and offered advice on developing strategies for a successful job search.



**Julie Ciccolini**

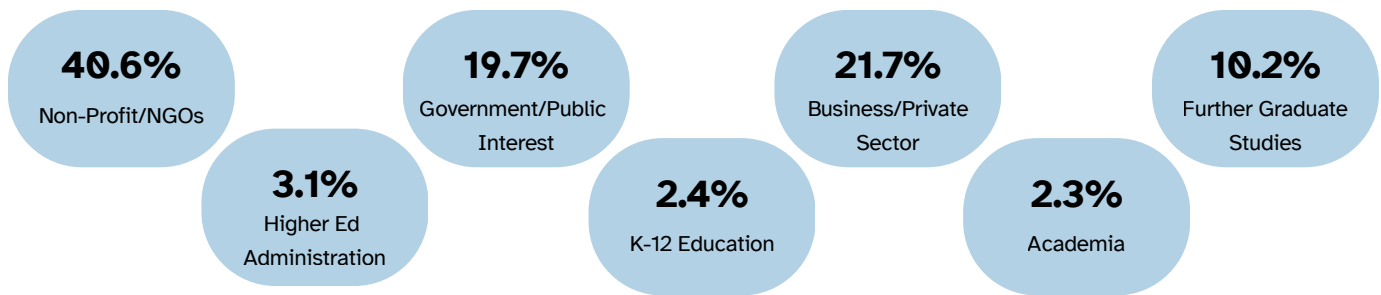
**Julie Ciccolini**, HRSMA '18, has dedicated her career to building technology to advance human rights. She is the CEO and Founder of Techtivist, a software firm dedicated to empowering human rights defenders. After graduating from Columbia, she was a founding member of the Digital Investigations Lab at Human Rights Watch, a first of its kind initiative to apply emerging technology to bolster remote investigations into human rights abuses in over 90 countries. In her previous role at The Legal Aid Society, Julie designed software to identify and expose police misconduct, which prevented numerous wrongful convictions and sparked a movement to reform police secrecy. In 2020, Julie became the Director of Law Enforcement Accountability at the National Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers, where she created and directed The Full Disclosure Project to expand her software nationwide. In 2022, Julie founded Techtivist to fill a critical need in the human rights community for innovative software solutions that drive meaningful change. She was awarded the 2022 Outstanding Recent Alumni Award from Columbia University.
